In this webinar

- Mayors, reeves, councillors, etc., will be referred to as elected officials
- Cities, towns, villages, resort villages, hamlets and rural municipalities will be referred to as local authorities or public bodies



- Section 5 of LA FOIP indicates that every person has the right to "access to records that are in the possession or under the control of a local authority"
- Section 23.1 indicates that a local authority has a duty to protect personal information within "its possession or under its control"



- Possession is physical possession plus a measure of control of the record.
- Control connotes authority. A record is under the control of a public body when the public body has the authority to manage the record including restricting, regulating and administering its use, disclosure or disposition.



- One test to determine control is:
 - 1. Do the contents of the document relate to a departmental matter? and
 - 2. Can the public body reasonably expect to obtain a copy of the document upon request?
- Other factors to determine control can be found on page 75 of the *IPC Guide to Exemptions* found on our website.

E-mails of Elected Officials

Likely in control of the local authority – use local authority e-mail account

E-mails regarding the elected official's personal information E-mails regarding the elected official's efforts to get elected E-mails regarding the elected official's duties as an elected official

- Personal information is defined in subsection 23(1) of LA FOIP.
- A local authority may have possession or control of a lot of personal information of its elected officials, such as "employment history" and "personal opinions" or information related to the elected official as a ratepayer.
- 'Employment history' is the type of information normally found in a personnel file such as performance reviews, evaluations, disciplinary actions taken, reasons for leaving a job or leave transactions. It does not include work product.



- Work product is different
- 'Work product' means information prepared or collected by an individual or group of individuals as a part of the individual's or group's responsibilities or activities related to the individual's or group's employment or business.



- All information in the possession or under the control of the local authority is subject to access to information requests.
- A local authority must withhold personal information of an elected official pursuant to subsection 28(1) of LA FOIP unless there is a reason to disclose under 28(2) of LA FOIP or the individual provides consent.

nd Privacy Commissioner

On the other hand...

- The work product of an elected official must be released unless an exemption found in Part III of LA FOIP applies.
- The decision to withhold or release is up to the head.


